How was the survey made available?




Who completed the survey?









Note: No survey respondents selected options of "Temporarily staying with family/friends" or "Emergency shelter or transitional housing"














What one word best describes the New Richmond community?

"The expansion and increase of residents outpacing the capabilities of service providers in the City."

The New Richmond area is growing. What excites you most about the future growth of the community? What concerns you most about growth?

"As a transplant myself four years ago, I loved the smaller town feel and the downtown shops and independent businesses. I'm excited for a new public library, and would love to see some trail expansions into the newer housing developments. My fear is that with more housing and retailers, we will start to lose what I moved here for and that is the small town aesthetic."

"Excited to see new businesses and diverse population. Nervous about crime. Nervous the school system will not be supported with an increase in enrollment."

"Growth can make a more vibrant economy and tax base; provide more services; build better infrastructure; introduce more art & culture. But it can also mean more traffic; higher demand on public services; less peace & quiet and sense of security. We do not need to become another Hudson or Woodbury. Education needs to focus on quality of teachers and content of learning and less on expensive buildings & athletic fields. We need a new library with more space to allow for increased programming and community activities - a center for arts and culture and education. Hopefully we can grow but not destroy the small town charm and security."

"Growth is only a good thing if the city can handle it. With the growing number of people, especially kids, there is going to be a huge need for additional school buildings to keep our class sizes at an acceptable size, we're going to need additional recreational facilities (a second sheet of ice for hockey, additional baseball/softball fields, etc.) to allow our kids to grow and flourish like they should be able to do in a community like this. This city and surrounding area are already maxed out in some of these areas."

"I'm excited for more opportunities to shop and eat in our community to keep our money local. Safety is our main concern as roadways are always busy, and crime and drugs come with our close location to the bigger cities."

"Nothing excites me about the growth. The houses are too close together, too expensive, and the apartment buildings are all low-income. Nothing has been done to improve the town nor to reduce taxes. Not actively bringing in bigger businesses will continue to hurt the town."

"Take a look at the River Falls Main Street and duplicate it - Theater, a variety of shopping, not just bars and tattoo shops. I would love to see Knowles Avenue busy on a Saturday with people shopping and staying downtown and excited to be here as a destination. What concerns me is East St. Paul has moved in and so has crime. It is not small town anymore where you know everyone like 30 years ago. I would also like to see more fast food choices so we wouldn't have to go to Hudson."

"We have the ability to have all the perks of the cities without the traffic and with a strong sense of community. We should continue to improve our schools and recreational opportunities for the kids to continue to keep the quality of life high for kids and families."


"I'm not excited about the growth. I'm concerned about crime and higher property taxes."

"Making sure we are keeping people safe. I come from a very small town and it is struggling to grow. I love coming here not as a huge community but having great schools with opportunities. I just hope we are prepared for this growth. But with growth we need to invest in our people. Getting more facilities for kids to do great things. Investing wisely and keeping this community safe and people having things to keep them here doing things in our town."

"I worry about discrimination that will come with growth. As our city grows, we will undoubtedly become more diverse, I fear our current population will not handle that diversity well and will not welcome the newcomers. Instead of seeing the positive side of a more diverse population, some people will only see in stereotypes, generalizations and outright racism. This saddens me, as I believe a more diverse community is a wonderful thing."

"I'm most concerned about push-back from long-time residents who don't want anything to change."




